#### **♦Gathering as God's People: Our Theme**

Our theme throughout these weeks leading into the Lenten season is "The Good News!" The word, "gospel" comes from the Anglo-Saxon term, *god-spell*, meaning "good story," which in both Greek and Latin are often translated as "good telling" or "good news." The good news points to the nearness of God's kingdom.

I chose the *Good News* theme because the New Testament readings in the lectionary are highlighting Luke's Gospel, Luke's *Good News*, which is uniquely inclusive, involving all people. In Luke, the good news is for the outcast and the establishment, for the religious and those searching. Luke speaks to all people - to the strong and healthy, to the weak and dispossessed - inspiring faith, spirituality, and action.

Richard Rohr points out, "For Luke, while the ultimate meaning of the good news is still the nearness of God's kingdom, he says it differently. He speaks not of God's kingdom but of God's justice, and he especially emphasizes the privileged position of the poor. Luke's Gospel is sometimes called the 'Gospel of the poor' or the 'Gospel of mercy.' [Luke] stresses the freedom and liberation which come from living simply and humbly, in right relationship with others, under the reign of God."

We are exploring the Gospel of Luke and delving into the Old Testament readings, which together, reveal wisdom and inform one another when put into conversation with one another. For much of the time, the Gospel will be considered alongside words from the Prophets, Jeremiah and Isaiah. This week we will hear again from Jeremiah.



In this "Ordinary Time" leading up to the Lenten Season, let us worship in the spirit of Epiphany - attentive to how the Divine is manifesting in our lives and aware that we work hand in hand with the Holy One to <u>live</u> the "good news."

Let us again consider the questions that we've been reflecting on throughout this theme: What might the Good News look like in your life? How might you recognize it beyond your own experience? In such challenging times, how do we honor the range of emotions and realities we are living and witnessing while opening our hearts to the possibility of liberation from such brokenness?
