"Jesus offers us a layered and complicated choice, one that is as complex as his own dualistic nature. The first option is self-denial, a heavy burden, and a lost—but saved—life. The second is gaining the whole world but forfeiting life. It's easy for a seasoned Christian to take this choice for granted. This choice that Jesus calls us into may even seem like a no brainer, but in this moment, Jesus teaches of the terrors that will befall him and invites the crowd to knowingly face that path alongside him. If we're honest, it is extremely difficult to reject the tempting power and wealth this world has to offer and allow our life to take the shape of good news for all.

The choice isn't an obvious one. One side looks like an opulent pile of riches, a crown, and endless power, while the other looks like tattered and worn hands with new life blooming out of wounds, work, burdens, and relationships. This choice may seem like a distant decision made long ago, but it's a decision to be made every single day, one moment at a time. In working for and with the downtrodden, poor, orphaned, widowed, ostracized, and oppressed, we will find ourselves."

Throughout Lent, we've been taking the opportunity to reflect on our lives, our relationships, our practices – contemplating how to better align our *doing* with our *being*.

The ultimate question asked repeatedly of Jesus throughout the Gospels is: "Who are you?" My sense is that if we examine that question, we might be better equipped to be in full relationship with Jesus.

We are exploring this question with the help of Diana Butler Bass's book, "Freeing Jesus," alongside the Bible Wisdom teachings and through our journey together - experiencing Jesus anew.

This week, we peel back the layers of *Jesus as Way*. Thinking through the potential meanings of "way" offers us a rich opportunity to search our own understandings - at both the head and the heart level - and pay attention to how we perceive Jesus when we look through the lens of "the way."

Diana Butler Bass observes, "Throughout the New Testament, Jesus invites people to follow him, to walk with him, to go on a journey. There is nothing particularly new in this, as the Hebrew scriptures are full of stories of wanderers, pilgrims, exiles, and immigrants." Throughout the Bible, as well as other wisdom literature, sacred texts, fairy tales, and even in our popular culture, we hear stories about the journey, the path, the odyssey, the passage. (Remember all those road trip movies you've seen!?!) These stories ignite our imaginations, open our hearts, and enable us to envision how we might navigate our own sojourn.



The word, "way," might trigger the assumption that there is THE way - one particular way, - rather than "A" way... As we have discussed over these past weeks, uncovering language, context, and meaning, empowers us to reclaim these words, or at least consider with fresh eyes whether a particular description or experience of Jesus provides you an entry point for a more intimate relationship with the Divine.

As we discover new understandings of Jesus, we come to better understand ourselves.

Do I notice where the sacred dwells? How might I release fear and embrace love? What *way* might Jesus be revealing to me?

Jesus invites: "I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved and will come in and go out and find pasture." (John 10: 9)

Welcome

Lent reveals the liminal space of beginnings and endings, of life and of death. The Lenten season is a period of prayer, reflection, and preparation, building in us the capacity to seek a deeper journey and a more intimate relationship with Jesus. Today we gather to celebrate and bear witness to Jesus Christ, the living Word, and proclaim the mystery of our faith. We come to the table in search of the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

Great Prayer of Thanksgiving The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is right and good that together we lift up Your name as holy, O God, Giver of New and Renewed Life! Always active, ever watchful, You keep Your promise even when we lose sight of all that you provide us. We fail to trust, we become distracted, we hurt one another and harm Your creation. Yet,

You claim us as Your very own in this life and all time to come. You make a way where there is no way, through your beloved Son.

Lord Jesus, we are grateful that you walked among us to show us the way toward wholeness. Through your life, ministry, death, and resurrection, you manifest the love poured out for us and the love that we are called to share with the world.

Abiding Spirit, you provide glimpses of the Christ among us every day, joining us together as the Body of Christ.

Through your powerful love and abiding presence, draw us into Christ's presence, and may we also be present to one another as we share in this holy meal of bread and cup.

Gracious God,
pour out your Holy Spirit upon us
and upon these your gifts of bread and wine,
that the bread we break
and the cup we bless
may be the communion of the body and blood of Christ.
By your Spirit make us one with Christ,
that we may be one with all who share this feast,
united in ministry in every place.
As this bread is Christ's body for us,
send us out to be the body of Christ in the world.

We join our voices as one, praying as Jesus taught us:

Our Father, who is in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name.

Thy kingdom come.
Thy will be done
on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors.
And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.
For Thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. Amen.

Words of Invitation and the Breaking of the Bread Jesus said:

Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls.

I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

In fellowship and at table, Jesus again revealed to the disciples what was to come through his life, death, and resurrection. He took bread, blessed it, and broke it. Then he gave it to his disciples, saying, Take, eat, this is my body broken for you. Do this in remembrance of me.

He then took up the cup, blessed the juice of the vine and gave it to the disciples, saying, Drink of the cup of life, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.

Pastor: Come, let's share in the feast of new and everlasting life!

All: We are ready. The Table is set. And we remember. Your Spirit is life. Through this faithful act of communing, You join us more deeply to Yourself, to Your people here and to all Your people. In deepest gratitude, we imbibe grace!

You are invited to come forward to celebrate in the Lord's Supper. Please bring your worship elements with you if you haven't already placed them on the worship table.
