



This Easter morning, we are powerfully reminded that death does not have the last word! We awaken to resurrection and the promise of renewal. On this blessed Sunday we rejoice in the risen power of love, hope, and new life.

In the Gospel of John, through the raising of Lazarus, Jesus shows the power of eternal life triumphing over death. Jesus calls each of us into new life.

Lazarus was the brother of Mary and Martha, and they were among Jesus' closest friends. Lazarus' name in Hebrew means "God has helped."

Lazarus came down with an unnamed, serious illness, and when his sisters Mary and Martha realized his condition was worsening, sent word to Jesus for help.

Jesus was preaching out of town, and when he got word of Lazarus's illness replied, "This sickness will not end in death. No, it is for God's glory so that God's Son may be glorified through it." (V4) Then he stayed where he was for two more days.

We might expect (as Lazarus' family did), that He would come running to help. But God's timing is not our timing. His delay in coming to Lazarus is a great example.

(John 11: 17-27) When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world."

Friends, this is the joyful feast of the people of God! They will come from east and west and from north and south, and sit at table in the kingdom of God.

The risen Lord invites all to participate in the new life he brings by sharing the feast which he has prepared.

Let us celebrate what God has done, is doing, and will do.

Spirit, in whom Jesus abides, your abiding love is woven within us and surrounds us always. Gift us with your presence, blessing the bread and juice we are about to receive and through which we will be nourished and united. By your Spirit make us one with Christ, one with each other, and one in ministry to all the world.

As renewed people, let us join our voices together in The Lord's Prayer:
