All: Praise be to God!

♦Sharing our Innermost Lives with God

One: When we "exercise dominion" over the earth we are fulfilling our basic purpose. Created in God's image – Man and Woman – we are responsible to God and we are "expected to manage and develop and care for creation, a task that includes actual physical work." (Ian Hart from *Theology of Work Project Biblical Studies*, Editor Sean McDonough)

All: Our work in God's image begins with faithfully representing God.

One: You brought order from chaos at the creation. We feel the forces of chaos swirling all around, within, and through us. We ask you to re-order our lives, our nation, and our world so that we, and everyone, and every living thing can fulfill your intention for us.
