♦Gathering as God's People: Our Theme

In this season as we take stock and consider where we have been and where we feel led to go, we have explored individual spiritual gifts, needs/gifts to the wider world, opportunities to pray for countries and communities different from ourselves, and last week we pondered the divine inscriptions God writes in our hearts.

This week, the forth in our series "**Gifts and Gratitude**," we reflect on our spiritual gifts and needs as individuals and within our community through three diverse indigenous physical prayer forms – tobacco/corn offerings, tying knots and prayer flags. Each comes from a different tradition which whispers our graditudes and prayers to the world and to the Divine – on the wind.

Today we'll *make* 'prayers' manifest, drawing on Native American prayer ties, knot tying from South America and Tibetan Wind Horse Prayer flags. We'll hang the physical forms of our prayers outside on the prayer tree, in Tippe gardens or at your home.

♦Gathering Hymn "Oh Great Spirit"

Rosie leads us in this chant. Please stand as you are able.

Oh Great Spirit! Earth, Wind, Sky and Sea You are inside And all around me, around me

♦Opening Ourselves to God's Grace.

Indigenous peoples have long understood our world as a reflection of its Divine Creator, seeing Spirit in all living things. The ancient Incan form of accounting reflects those knotty places in our lives where we are tied up in knots — and the help we need to untie them. And, the millennial old Wind Horse combines the shamanic animism of early Tibetans with Buddhist philosophy sending compassion into the world.

Reflection Questions

- ♦ Do I sense the shift I want to happen within me?
- ♦ Am I opening myself to change with gratitude to Spirit?
- ♦ If I've tied myself into knots, how can I untie them?
- ♦ If I stand in the storm, will I be blown away?

Keep these questions in your heart as we chant.

♦Reflective Hymn Om Mani Padme Hum

Rosie leads us in this chant.

Please remain seated.

For your information... each syllable represents one of the six goals of Buddhist existence to heal, purify and brings forth the positive qualities.

- **Om** = sound of the universe; divine energy; generosity; and purifies the ego
- **Ma** = represents ethics and purifies jealousy
- **Ni** = represents patience and purifies want or desire
- **Pad** = represents diligence and purifies ignorance and judgment
- **Me** = represents concentration and purifies attachment
- **Hum** = the unity of all; represents wisdom and purifies hatred.

We will take three short journeys, one into each prayer tradition.


You will have some time to form a wind prayer that reflects gratitude directly and/or metaphorically in your life. You may choose one or more prayers:

Tibetan Wind Horse Flags


