By the time you come to the end of this blessing these words will be barely enough to fit in the palm of your hand

but fold your fingers around them and take them as an offering a sacrament a sign:

touch the words to your tongue and taste how they have traveled through marrow and bone to reach you, how they have passed through each chamber of the heart, how they have come through the layers that make up the soul: the strata of stories and questions, longings and dreams.

Savor the way the words are not mere residue or dross, the bitter leavings from the refining. By their taste you will know instead they are the essence they are the core they are what has come through the burning,

holding still the memory of fire and the imprint of light; holding the clarity that comes when all that is not needful passes away.

So take these words
as a blessing; touch them

Throughout the fall season, leading up to Advent, we continue to explore the theme of "Gifts and Gratitude."


We've been thinking about our spiritual gifts, those gifts that we recognize in others, what happens when we bring our spiritual gifts to bear in community, and last week as we marked All Saints Day, we celebrated those, both living and dead, who have transformed us through the sharing of their gifts as well as what they have modeled for us and how we ourselves might show up as saints in others' lives. So much to be grateful for!

Last Sunday we focused on part of Matthew's Gospel – the "Beatitudes" - the portion of the Sermon on the Mount when Jesus is reminding people of what a blessed life might look like: "Blessed are those who mourn, God will comfort them" and "Blessed are the pure in heart, they will see God."

Immediately after that text, Jesus continues his sermon and speaks about salt and light. This seems like the next step in our exploration – to think about what it means to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world.

Jesus is inviting us to think about salt's worth and purpose, to acknowledge the gift of light and honor the light in each of us. Let's continue to contemplate what we carry within us and how to share that with others.

Welcome

Walking down the Mount of Beatitudes in Israel offers a unique opportunity to reflect on being light in the world. The first thing God created was light. Like salt, it is essential to life. Light has a purpose - to guide us, to keep us from being afraid, to illuminate what is hidden, to provide warmth.

Just as the suggestion that salt would stop being salty, it seems just as ridiculous that you would light a candle and hide it away or paint a light fixture black. Doing so defeats its purpose for being.

In John's Gospel, Jesus says he is the Light of the World. If Jesus is the Light of the World, then how can we be? Maybe Matthew heard Jesus wrong. But if we think back to what else Jesus said in John's Gospel, we are reminded that if we abide in Jesus, Jesus abides in us. And when the incarnate Jesus left this world, Jesus didn't leave us orphaned because we received the Holy Spirit.

As we abide in Christ, we become the light of the world. Certainly, we are not Jesus but our words and actions seek to glorify God. This is what God wants to make clear in this passage. It's not that God can't save the world all on God's own, but in God's plan of redemption, we are as essential as salt and light.

Let us give thanks to the Lord.



Great Prayer of Thanksgiving

Holy God, you created the world and all who live in it. As your first act of creation, you said, "Let there be light." There was light, and it was good. You make the sunrise on the good and evil alike, for your love has no prejudice. It is not dependent on who we are but is steadfast and true because that is who you are.

Jesus, Light of the World, you came into the world so we may have life. In the mystery of God, you call us to be light in the world because life is something to be shared. With your compassion for the sick, the poor, and the outcast, you taught us

what love is. In the glory of your resurrection, you demonstrated how far love will go. Love, life, light - you have given us a purpose in the world.

Holy Spirit, light within us, you enable us to be the fragrance of life and the salt of the earth. You lead our hearts so that we may season the world with grace. In the same way, you gather us at this Table to sustain us so that we may be salt and light in the world.

Ever thankful, we pray that you would sprinkle salt on this meal we share today. May it renew our communion in Christ and with one another. With joy, we celebrate that this meal is not limited to this time and place. And so, as you bind us together with the cup band the loaf, we give thanks that this table extends to every cathedral, sanctuary, home, and group where two or three gather in your name.

With the boldness of those who know the love of God, the light of Christ, and the saltiness of the Holy Spirit, we join our voices in the prayer you taught us. Using the words each of us find most familiar, we pray:

Our Father, who is in heaven,
Hallowed be Thy name.
Thy kingdom come.
Thy will be done
on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive our debts, as we forgive our debtors.
And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.
For Thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever.
Amen

Words of Invitation and the Breaking of the Bread

As Jesus sat down to eat with his disciples, he took the bread, broke it, and gave thanks. He then passed it to his disciples, saying, "Eat! This is my body broken for you." Next, he took the cup, and after he had blessed it, he gave it to the disciples and said, "Drink! This is the blood of the new covenant. My blood shed for you."

You are the salt of the earth.

You are the light of the world.

These are holy statements - and they are impossible statements. But when faced with the impossible, Jesus reminds us that in him, all things are possible. So, come: eat and drink so that body and soul may be nourished so that we may go out and bear the ministry of Jesus into the world.

Faithful and loving God, you created salt within the earth to protect and heal; to cure and add flavor to the food we eat. When you created our bodies, you put that salt in us. In you, we are the salt of the earth.

As we reflect on these mysteries, we give you thanks for the sustenance you have provided at your Table. May our light so shine before people that you will be glorified and the whole world would join us in our praise of you. Amen.
