TWO: Not being strong enough.

THREE: Losing my job.

FOUR: That we will forget we belong to one another.

ONE: Climate change.

TWO: My child having to learn gun violence drills at school.

THREE: Spiders.

FOUR: Not having someone to take care of me; not having someone who knows

my stories.

ONE: Chronic illness.

TWO: Ending up alone.

THREE: Nightmares.

FOUR: Stopping short of following God all the way.

THREE: Today we light the candle of peace, because we so desperately need God's peace in the midst of all we fear.

FOUR: May this light be a reminder that Christ is coming. God was with generations before, God is with us today, and God will be with us tomorrow. Even now, God is on the way. Amen.

Our Advent Series ~ From Generation to Generation

On this second Sunday of Advent, we continue with our series, "From Generation to Generation," which will include a theme to focus on each week. This week we'll reflect on the theme: "God Meets Us in Our Fear." This is a powerful theme to consider as we turn our attention to peace.

This season, through different Gospel readings from Matthew and Luke, alongside the Book of Isaiah, we are piecing together a chronological storyline that leads up to Christ's birth. We'll learn about the many people involved in this story, and through the Bible Wisdom teachings, we'll seek the full scope of the Christmas story.

The stories, scriptures, and traditions of the Christmas season have been passed down to us throughout the generations. Many of us enter this season with a swell of memories and emotions as vast as the cultural and religious rituals this holiday holds. Like a tapestry woven throughout time, the Christmas story weaves us in – to remember how God has shown up in the past, to continue the work of collective liberation, to behold the presence of God in flesh and bone.

As we hear these familiar texts yet again, let's pay attention to each of the characters and ask ourselves: What did each person pass on or contribute? How did they either participate in God's liberation and love—or try to thwart God's justice? What can we learn from them, and what is our role now? What will we pass on to the next generation?

As we look through this series' lens: "From Generation to Generation," it points to the ways our lives, histories, actions, and stories are interconnected and woven together. The work of God is always unfolding—in and through us. This Advent, may we each remember that we belong—to a story etched into the wrinkles of time, to generations that have come before and will come after, to a love that won't let go.

Fear can be a good thing. It can help us be attentive while driving down the highway. It can alert us to possible accidents. It can motivate us to do our best.

However, fear can also be harmful.

For so many of us, fear of the other, fear of failure, or fear of the unknown has led us to make harmful choices in our lives—choices such as building walls or tearing others down.

Today, in fuller awareness, we ask for mercy and pray for guidance. In our confession, we come before an entirely merciful and loving God who says to us, "Do not be afraid." Let us pray:

ALL: Patient God,

you know just how often
we make decisions from a place of fear rather than love.
You know just how often
we allow fear to take the place of logic,
fanning unhealthy fires in our lives.
You know just how often
we tuck your words, "Do not be afraid"
on dusty shelves and in the back of closets,
stubbornly holding onto our own point of view.
Forgive us for giving fear the microphone.
Silence the voices of scarcity, shame, and rejection,
which spark and feed so much of our fear,
to recenter us in love.
With hope we pray, amen.

The Birth of Jesus Foretold

In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, 'Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you.' But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end.' Mary said to the angel, 'How can this be, since I am a virgin?' The angel said to her, 'The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God. And now, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son; and this is the sixth month for her who was said to be barren. For nothing will be impossible with God.' Then Mary said, 'Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word.' Then the angel departed from her.

Isaiah 11:1-10

The Peaceful Kingdom
A shoot shall come out from the stock of Jesse,

The cow and the bear shall graze, their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox. The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den. They will not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain; for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea.

Welcome

Advent is a time for contemplating where we've been and where we're going. As we reflect on our connections through the generations — the traditions we hold dear, the rituals that nurture and sustain us, the gifts and the heartache that our elders have passed on to us — we are invited today to consider the gift of peace that is always available to us. Although there is much to fear, although we are often mired down by worry, recoil at the thought of failure, struggle with uneasiness in our work and uncertainty in our relationships, we are reminded over and over again that we need not be afraid. We are not alone. We are seen and heard, loved and forgiven.



In this community we bear witness to one another as we share our stories and as we revel in the beauty of the stories leading up to the birth of Jesus. We turn to these stories every season, and at every communion we remember the story of a Messiah who gathered his friends together for one last supper, the story of a Messiah who loved us so much he just couldn't stay away.

So, friends, bring the parts of you that are so hungry for peace, the parts of you that are afraid and worried and distressed. And let us bring the parts of us that are aching to hear the stories again that reveal to us the good news.

As we partake of the Lord's Supper, we are reminded that God is present with us always. Jesus walks alongside us. The Holy Spirit watches over us. We share in the celebration and are sustained through this shared meal.

Abiding Spirit, you provide glimpses of the Christ among us every day, joining us together as the Body of Christ. Through your powerful love and abiding presence, draw us into the peace of Christ, equip us to deepen our peaceful community as we share in this holy meal of bread and cup.

that the bread we break
and the cup we bless
may be the communion of the body and blood of Christ.
By your Spirit make us one with Christ,

Words of Invitation and the Breaking of the Bread

Jesus said:
Come to me,
all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens,
and I will give you rest.
Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me,
