First, you must take a deep breath.

dinner.


Four: Time with family.

♦Gathering as God's People:

Our Advent Series ~ From Generation to Generation

On this third Sunday of Advent, the Sunday of "Joy," we continue with our series, "From Generation to Generation," and focus on a theme each week. This week we'll reflect on the theme: "We Can Choose a Better Way." We are all faced with joys and challenges everyday – when we look back, are there times we wish we had taken the time to absorb the joy unfolding in front of us or been able to handle a difficult situation differently? What might it look like to "choose a better way?"

This season, through different Gospel readings from Matthew and Luke, alongside the Book of Isaiah, we are piecing together a chronological storyline that leads up to Christ's birth, providing a fuller sense of the Christmas story. Today we will hear the familiar story of Joseph, as he takes in the news that Mary is with child. Ultimately, we witness him choose a better way...but it takes some pretty powerful intervention to make it so.

Like a tapestry woven throughout time, the Christmas story weaves us in – to remember how God has shown up in the past, to continue the work of collective liberation, to behold the presence of God in flesh and bone.

As we take in these stories, let's pay attention to the framework of Advent. The word, Advent, comes from the Latin, "adventus," which means, "coming" or "arrival." It is a time for preparation and reflection, an opportunity to slow down from the frenetic pace that often accompanies the Christmas season, a time of waiting and watching, of keeping awake! Let us remain alert and pay attention to the ways we are transformed and invited into further transformation.

The work of God is always unfolding—in and through us. This Advent, may we each remember that we belong—to a story etched into the wrinkles of time, to generations that have come before and will come after, to a love that won't let go.

♦Opening Ourselves to God's Grace

A series of experiments by Princeton psychologists, Janine Willis and Alexander Todorov, taught the world that it only takes a tenth of a second for us to form an impression of a stranger. In other words, it only takes a tenth of a second for us to look at someone's face and determine a stereotype about who they are.

With decisions happening *that* quickly, it is not hard to imagine why we might need this moment of confession.

The prayer of confession is an opportunity to slow down. We take that tenth of a second and give it room to breathe. We reflect on the decisions that we've made this past week and we ask for God's mercy to be in all of them.

And without fail, God wiggles God's self into the cracks of our lives, and we are made better for it. So with that confidence, let us go to God in prayer:

♦Sharing Our Innermost Lives with God

ALL: God of mercy,

a million times a day we have the opportunity to be gracious,

to assume the best in others,

to give the benefit of the doubt.

A million times a day we could choose the better way,

but so often we don't.

Fear and greed kick in.

Assumptions and insecurities take the wheel.

Comparison and critique lead the charge.

Forgive us for forgetting that we are descendants of Joseph.

Forgive us for forgetting that grace and mercy are in our blood.

Forgive us for forgetting that all belong to you.

Give us the courage to love even bigger than before,

and the wisdom to choose a better way.

Amen.

Matthew 1:18-25

The Birth of Jesus the Messiah

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins.' All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

'Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel',

which means, 'God is with us.' When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.

Isaiah 35:1-10

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing. The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God.

Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees. Say to those who are of a fearful heart, 'Be strong, do not fear! Here is your God. He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense. He will come and save you.'



Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes.

A highway shall be there,
and it shall be called the Holy Way;
the unclean shall not travel on it,
but it shall be for God's people;
no traveler, not even fools, shall go astray.
No lion shall be there,
nor shall any ravenous beast come up on it;
they shall not be found there,
but the redeemed shall walk there.
And the ransomed of the Lord shall return,
and come to Zion with singing;
everlasting joy shall be upon their heads;
they shall obtain joy and gladness,
and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

Your realm is within the human heart. We accept life for all that it can be, on earth as throughout all creation.

May we continue to draw sustenance from this earth, and may we receive forgiveness equal to our own.

to live in grace, with joy and love in our hearts, forever and ever. Amen.
