
Our Congregational Meeting takes place immediately after worship – please remain with us for this brief and important gathering.

#### **♦**Gathering as God's People: Intentional Reflection on Earth Day

In a time of climate crisis, disasters of Biblical scale are impacting our communities and the places we love. Today, just like in the Bible, floods and famines show us a deep truth about human life: that our lives are intimately dependent on the land. In our sacred scriptures, we read the stories of creatures made from the soil, whose lives are sustained—physically and spiritually—by the fruits of the land. In these stories, we see how, in the midst of disaster, the land can be fertile ground to sustain ourselves and to take prophetic action for justice.

Throughout the stories of the Bible, we read about agricultural acts and food systems. Like our food system stories today, these Biblical accounts are ones of destruction and recreation. They are stories of devastation and rebirth. They are stories of depletion and regeneration. They are stories of death and resurrection. The Biblical stories of the relationship between humans and the land, mediated by the food we eat, are central to our Christian theology.

In today's Bible Wisdom teaching from the Gospel of Luke, this human-land-food relationship is explored in the way a simple meal can reveal to us resurrection hope in the midst of death.

This year, within the PCUSA, Creation Justice Ministries is encouraging us to protect, restore, and more rightly share God's creation through the theme: "Sowing Seeds — Prophetic Action To Climate-Changed Lands. They are providing materials that educate us about the current state of climate and its impact on our food system, while answering our biblical call to seek justice for all of God's creation. We have printed off a copy of their resource, which highlights community and political action we can take, as well as outlining the new Farm Bill that is moving through legislation right now. You can view it at the back of the sanctuary.

Within the Presbytery, Tippe is a Hunger Action Congregation — we live into that through our Hungry Hearts and garden ministries, as well as coordinating dinners every night for our guests during the warming season. This week I participated in a presentation that educated us about the Farm Bill, which is renewed about every five years. The presenter told us, "If you eat food or know anyone who eats food, then this bill directly impacts every part of your meal from where and how your food is grown; how it is cleaned or processed; how much it costs; and any money you may receive to help pay for your food." I'm also emailing a link to everyone so that you are aware of what is at stake and how to get involved. There are vast systems connected to our food, which impact every aspect of our lives, our health, and the health of the planet: how food is grown, whether its treated with chemicals, how the land is prepared and harvested, packaging and transporting, preparing and distributing, what we do with food waste - every step is a consideration because it touches on issues of social justice and how we treat one another and creation.

There is so much to think about and to pray for, and there is also much that inspires hope and creative solutions.

### **♦Bible Wisdom Teaching** Luke 24:13-35

Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" They stood still, looking sad.

Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?" He asked them, "What things?" They replied, "The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him."

Then he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?" Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over." So he went in to stay with them.

When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight.

They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?"


That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. They were saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!"

Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.
