O come, now Wisdom from on high and order all things far and nigh: To us the path of knowledge show, and help us in that way to go.



O that you would tear open the heavens and come down,

Mark 13: 24-27, 32-37

24 'But in those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened,

and the moon will not give its light,

25 and the stars will be falling from heaven,

and the powers in the heavens will be shaken.

26 Then they will see "the Christ coming in clouds" with great power and glory.
27 Then the angels will be sent out, and the elect will be gathered from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven.

32 'But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Christ, but only Yahweh. 33 Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. 34 It is like a person going on a journey, when they leave home and put their slaves in charge, each with their work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. 35 Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the ruler of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, 36 or else the sovereign may suddenly arrive and find you asleep. 37 And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake.'

Welcome

In a way, Advent is always the beginning of the end. But we do not celebrate as if it is a funeral dirge. Instead, we increase the light with candles, we decorate festively, we celebrate. The progression of Advent is hope, peace, joy, and love. These are not emotions – they are a way of being. We cannot pick and choose them: they build upon one another. Hope is necessary to have peace. Without peace, there can be no joy. Joy begets love.

And it all begins with hope.

As we hear in Isaiah, our iniquities draw us away from God. We suffer moments of poor judgement. We make mistakes. We fail. This doesn't mean we don't value our relationships or care for the world, but it does mean that we don't place our hope in them. They are not the source of our identity. Our identity is found in the Triune God.

Let us offer our thanks.

Great Prayer of Thanksgiving

In the love of God, we have been given life and the world in which to live it. Even as the leaves have turned and fallen away and the snow will soon settle and cover the earth, we know the promise of life never ends. As God gives us the Sabbath of winter, we know that spring is being readied.

ALL: For Creation and Sabbath, God, we give you thanks.

In the grace of Jesus Christ, we have been given new life and a world in which to share it. As we anticipate the Incarnation, we are reminded once again of Jesus' ministry among us. Preaching and healing, Jesus binds up what is broken and sets free that which is bound. Teaching and forgiving, Jesus feeds us on God's Word so that we can continue Christ's ministry in the world.

ALL: for your welcoming and sending, Jesus, we give you thanks. In the communion of the Holy Spirit, we, the many, become one. Speaking to us through God's Word, we hear the message of both repentance and forgiveness. Living and active, the Holy Spirit calms the storms that churn within us while also calling us
