

May I live this day



♦Gathering as God's People: Seasons of Contemplation & Illumination



In these Sundays after the Epiphany, we live into the insights gained throughout the season, in which we wait for the light to come forth. Many of our winter days are overcast and drab, and yet we know with each passing day, we gain more daylight as our hemisphere tilts incrementally closer to the sun. This gain will be minuscule at first, just a matter of seconds a day, but will steadily grow until daylight expands by three daily minutes per day in March.

In the past week, I've experienced a mixture of highs and lows, and I imagine that is the case for you, as well. This pattern echoes our exploration of the Gospel of Matthew, the words of the prophet Isaiah, and the wisdom of the Psalms, as we've reflected on seasons of light and dark in our lives. Over these past weeks, we have considered what lights our way, what glimmers of light appear in the dark, the treasures that are waiting for us there, and how we might more intentionally shine our own light.

At a point that was especially difficult for me this week, I was minutes away from our Monday night zoom worship and hadn't been able to do any preparation for it. But I showed up, as did a couple of other precious people, and we sat together in the moment. We listened to one another, we acknowledged our struggles and named our vulnerabilities, we talked about what buoys us and what moves us more deeply into the "divine dance" with God. That time together shaped the way I experienced the rest of my week and has pointed me toward contemplation over the past few days.

Many of us are in desperate need of contemplation, of stillness, of centering ourselves in the deep knowing that is waiting within each of us. So, I invite us into a contemplative space and welcome you to carry this with you going forward, as you acknowledge where you are hurting, discover your gifts and strengths, and as we discern together how we as individuals might continue to accompany one another and move forward as a beloved community. Let us practice contemplation and seek illumination together.

I am exalted in the earth.'


