Surely God is in this place, Holy Ground! Surely God is in this place, Holy Ground!

Last Sunday we celebrated Epiphany, and in just six short weeks we will enter the Lenten season. This window of time, according to our liturgical calendar, is called "Ordinary Time," in which there are no high holy days or celebrations. After Easter, we will enter a much longer stretch of Ordinary Time, until we turn our attention again to Advent and the lead up to Christmas.

This season beckons us to find the sacred in its subtlety. In the introduction to her book, The Time Between: Cycles and Rhythms in Ordinary Time, Wendy M. Wright reminds us that the "ordinary" in "Ordinary Time" does not mean "boring, uneventful, undistinguished, every day." Rather, it "comes from the word ordinal, to count." With its being a seemingly in-between time, however, Wright observes that this season holds us in a different way than do the seasons "when the beauty of the faith is etched in high relief." She writes, "I like to think of the entire spectrum of the liturgical cycle of Ordinary Time with all its varied rhythms—of Sunday observance, daily prayer, the holy cycle, the tapestry of stories that dramatize the call and response of Jesus and the first disciples, the seasons of our own discipleship throughout the life cycle, the ritual practice of the great Christian rites, the dynamics of our inner faith lives—as one greater movement of desire to be face-to-face, heart-to-heart with God. The deep grammar of the church year's Ordinary Time is perhaps uttered most keenly in our ceaseless longing. By it we are propelled into the future. We pine for it as past. We trace the surface of the present with anxious fingertips. Call our desire awareness, mindfulness, mysticism, aesthetic sensitivity, faithfulness, or whatever. It is the fundamental movement of the Christian life."

As we enter this Ordinary Time, I see a wonderful opportunity to maintain our focus on the star – a star that guides us, that illuminates our journey, that provides a focal point as we discern where we feel led and how we are called to bring our gifts to bear. With that in mind, let us open with a prayerful poem written by Macrina Wiederkehr:
