A Blessing for Traveling in the Dark ~ Jan Richardson



A night sky with a band of stars Go slow if you can. Slower. More slowly still. Then again, it is true: different darks have different tasks, and if you have arrived here unawares, if you have come in peril or in pain, this might be no place you should dawdle.

I do not know what these shadows ask of you, what they might hold that means you good or ill. It is not for me to reckon whether you should linger or you should leave.

But this is what I can ask for you:

That in the darkness there be a blessing.
That in the shadows there be a welcome.
That in the night you be encompassed by the Love that knows your name.

♦Gathering as God's People: The Gifts Revealed in Darkness

In this "ordinary time," in the weeks since Christmastide, leading up to the Lenten season, we've explored the gifts of light as we imagine the star that the magi followed, witnessed the increase in daylight hours since December 22nd, and noted the images of light and color and pattern that mandalas offer us as a center point for contemplation. This week we will consider the gifts of darkness - these gifts might take some deeper consideration to find, since light imagery is so rich in describing how we benefit. Yet, we know deep down that darkness is also a sacred aspect of our lives.

As we've turned our attention to light, we've noted the sacred cycles of seasons; of birth, death, and resurrection; of patterns in our lives and rhythms of connection in the natural world and through our relationships. These cycles are illuminated by light and deepened by the dark. We cannot know light without darkness and vice versa.

We know full well that life is filled with both joy and sorrow. We are never exempt from pain, and just when we think we have life under control, a lightning bolt may hit and shatter our well-constructed walls. Darkness comes in varying intensity, and by several means. We see the darkness, we touch and feel it, we lose our way in it. And candles are lit. We see. We hope. There is darkness and there is light. We live with both.

Richard Rohr says that if our posture with the darkness is to 'stand angrily, obsessively against it, ... we will become mirror images of it.' A mature posture in life is to be honest in naming the darkness and to pay attention to what we experience and come to know as we move through the dark/unknown/mystery times in our lives.

Our acts of justice, sacrifices of love, and ministry projects provide a glimmer in dark places - a sign of a greater Light remains with us always. And in a mysterious way we will find life's gifts, which sometimes hide in the darkness. Today we'll hear Bible Wisdom teachings that reference the dark just as we continue to attend to the light. Let us especially carry within us what God says in the Book of Isaiah, "I will give you the treasures of darkness and riches stored in secret places."

May your powerful presence become obvious not only in the undeniable glory of the sky, but also in the seemingly base and common processes of the earth.


Give us what we need, day by day, to keep body and soul together, because clever as you have made us,
