


This series encourages us to consider, "How can we listen to one another? How do we find connection despite difference? How do we create space for compassionate dialogue and for seeking the holy in one another?" These questions are especially relevant as we discern way forward together as a community, as we seek to understand our call in our current context – what missions and ministries are we led to engage in? How might we assess our capacity for the work we feel led to do? This journey is only possible if we come to know one another more fully and enter into discernment with intention.

In the previous two weeks, we've explored together the questions, "where are you from" and "where does it hurt." This week's question, "what do you need," recognizes that we all have needs and that we need each other. It reminds us that we each have unique needs; we can't assume to know what is best for others. It also prompts us to reflect on our own needs, priorities, and desires, which can sometimes be difficult to discern from one situation to the next.

In our Bible Wisdom teachings today, through the First Testament, we will witness that in the midst of Job's afflictions, three of his friends promptly leave their homes and come to him. They tear their garments, weep loudly, and sit with him for seven days, saying nothing. Their response is the ministry of presence, of true solidarity, of

seeing his excruciating pain and joining him there. In this morning's Gospel reading, Paul, who has been beaten and imprisoned, writes to Timothy with a simple request: "Come quickly." He lists those who abandoned him, but says, "I hope that God doesn't hold it against them!" In his greatest moment of need, Paul doesn't need revenge, but instead asks for companionship. In essence, this is what we all need—for someone to come quickly, to gather the items we want, and to simply show up.

How many of you have ever had a bad day and found someone offering you unsolicited advice? How many of you have ever had a bad week and had someone rush in with dozens of suggestions for how you might fix things, as if you hadn't thought of that before?

We have all been there, and we have all done that. It is part of our humanity.

Our scripture reminds us today that often in the face of hurt, what people really need is not a list of advice or solutions, but the simple presence of love.

So let us pray to God today, acknowledging that we are works in progress, and that relationships always come with mistakes and confession. Let us pray:

\$Sharing our Innermost Lives with God

Gracious God,

sometimes life feels like cooking with flour—

it looks like it should be easy, but we always make a mess.

This is particularly true when it comes to our relationships.

We so desperately long to say the right thing,

to be the right thing, to find the right solution,

that we overstep the line.

Forgive us for assuming the place you fill.

Forgive us for imagining that we, in all our humanity,

could possibly fix all the hurt in this world.

Instead, give us the grace and the strength to stand by our loved ones

in their moments of need to witness their hurt without trying to fix it.

You are God. We are not. Teach us how to be a friend.

Teach us how to ask, "What do you need?"

Teach us how to point to you.

Gratefully we pray. Amen.

Family of faith, no matter how many times you have spoken without listening, assumed without knowing, offered without asking, or rushed without waiting—you are forgiven.

God knows your desire and your intent.

God knows when we try and miss the mark, and God surrounds us in grace.

♦Bible Wisdom Teachings Job 2: 11-13

11 Now when Job's three friends heard of all these troubles that had come upon him, each of them set out from his home—Eliphaz the Temanite, Bildad the Shuhite, and Zophar the Naamathite. They met together to go and console and comfort him. 12 When they saw him from a distance, they did not recognize him, and they raised their voices and wept aloud; they tore their robes and threw dust in the air upon their heads. 13 They sat with him on the ground for seven days and seven nights, and no one spoke a word to him, for they saw that his suffering was very great.

2 Timothy 4: 9-18

9 Do your best to come to me soon, 10 for Demas, in love with this present world, has deserted me and gone to Thessalonica; Crescens has gone to Galatia, Titus to Dalmatia. 11 Only Luke is with me. Get Mark and bring him with you, for he is useful in my ministry. 12 I have sent Tychicus to Ephesus. 13 When you come, bring the cloak that I left with Carpus at Troas, also the books, and above all the parchments. 14 Alexander the coppersmith did me great harm; the Lord will pay him back for his deeds. 15 You also must beware of him, for he strongly opposed our message.

16 At my first defense no one came to my support, but all deserted me. May it not be counted against them! 17 But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed, and all the Gentiles might hear it. So I was rescued from the lion's mouth. 18 The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and save me for his heavenly kingdom. To him be the glory for ever and ever. Amen.
